## Commitment to Child Safety

Sacred Heart College Yarrawonga is committed to the safety and wellbeing of all students at the College.

As a Catholic school, we are entrusted with the holistic education of the child, in partnership with parents, guardians and caregivers who are the primary educators of their children. Sacred Heart College will implement the Child Safe Standards to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all students at the College and promote an organisational culture that manages the risk of child abuse and neglect.

## Child Safe Standards

All schools in Australia are mandated to comply with the eight Child Safe Standards.

The standards are in place to keep your children safe. In order for us at Sacred Heart College to comply, it is imperative that we know who is on site between 8.30am and 3:30pm, the reason for their visit and how long they will be on site for. As such, any visitor to our school (including parents, volunteers and trades people), must enter via the front Administration Office and cannot simply enter any of the learning areas before doing so. Please do not be offended if a staff member asks you the reason for your visit or if you have signed in. This is for the safety of all children.

## Year 7 Humanities

The beginning of their secondary school journey for our new Year 7 cohort provides an exciting opportunity to learn new skills and knowledge in Humanities. Over the course of the year, students will engage in learning across four major topics, being: History, Geography, Business and Economics, and Civics and Citizenship. We have begun the 2020 year by investigating a range of important historical skills, which when mastered, help students develop curiosity and imagination, ask critical questions and become confident in studying different eras of history, be that ancient or modern. Awareness of history is an essential characteristic of any society, and historical knowledge is fundamental to understanding ourselves and others. It promotes the understanding of societies, events, movements and developments that have shaped humanity from earliest times. It helps students appreciate how the world and its people have changed, as well as the significant continuities that exist to the present day.

## Year 8 Humanities

The Year 8 Humanities program allows students to delve deeper into the four major topics studied in Year 7. We have started the new year by looking into the significance of cities around the world. The year 2007 marked the time in history when more people around the globe live in an urban area as opposed to a rural area. This trend is continuing to increase. Cities are under immense pressure in terms of their liveability. Roads and public transport are struggling to keep up with increases in populations. Access to healthcare, impacts on the environment and the social wellbeing of its citizens are other aspects that need to be considered. Students are investigating the different causes and consequences of urbanisation around the world, focusing on Australia, Indonesia, and the USA, whilst looking at the challenges for future city planners.

## Year 9/10 Humanities

To conclude, our studies classes will be researching the Holocaust and analyse the unfathomable events that transpired throughout the War period.

# Housekeeping

## Medication Administration at School

In order to adhere to WorkSafe laws, the College is not able to administer over-the-counter medication that has not been authorised by a medical practitioner. This includes, but is not limited to, Panadol and other analgesics, cough mixtures, motion sickness medication and homoeopathic remedies/medications. For school staff to administer prescription medications, a parent or legal guardian must fill out a written request form provided by the College. The medication must be in the original container labeled by a pharmacist or doctor showing the name of the drug, the 'use by' date, the name of the child's medical practitioner and the child, the dosage and the frequency of administration.

## When My Child Becomes Unwell At School

Parents are advised that unwell students are required to go via the office if they need to be collected from school due to illness. When a student is unwell they need to go to the office and the office personnel will contact the parents or guardians to come and collect them. Under no circumstances are students to contact parents using their mobile phones or via email whilst at school.

## Visitors to the College

Visitors to the College are advised that they must sign in at either office before entering the school grounds. Under no circumstances are visitors allowed on the premises without signing in. Your cooperation regarding this is appreciated. Identification may be asked for.

## Absentees

Parents and guardians are required to notify the College of any student absentees either by contacting the College on (03) 5742 1300 or emailing [info@shcy.vic.edu.au](mailto:info@shcy.vic.edu.au) before 9:00am if practical.

## Late to School or Leaving Early

If you arrive late to school, please go to the Office to have your name marked on the roll. This ensures that parents are not notified of your absence via an sms. If students are leaving school early, please send in a note advising the time your child will leave or is being picked up by contacting the College in advance, if convenient. This way, we are able to have your child waiting in the Office. Students are to bring notes to the Office at the start of each day so that rolls can be marked and notes recorded.

## School Hats

At Sacred Heart College, health and safety is always a priority.

Because ultraviolet rays from the sun can damage skin and increase the risk of skin cancer, we have a policy to reduce sun exposure of the head and neck by encouraging our students to wear a sun-protective hat for all outdoor activities. It is College policy that all students must wear a hat during Terms 1 and 4 to reduce sun exposure when outside. For your convenience, the College now has a number of these school hats available to buy for just \$12 each.

These can be purchased at either the Kennedy or Wexford Office. Parents can still purchase all Sacred Heart College uniforms, including hats from Judds Menwear in Belmore Street Yarrowonga.

## Second Hand Uniforms

The College is always looking for donation of good, second hand uniforms. If you have any unwanted uniforms, please drop them into the College Administration. Donations are always very welcome.

## Lost Property Box

The Lost Property Box is located in the Wexford Corridor. If students are missing any items of clothing, please have them look here first. It's much easier to find the owner when items have names on them, so please make sure everything, including hats and drink bottles are labeled clearly. Parents are encouraged to have a look through the Lost Property Box before the end of each term, as unclaimed items of clothing will be donated to St Vincents.

## Wexford Campus

All students walking to or from the Wexford Campus must enter and leave via the walkway onto Witt Street between the Science Lab and Staff Room. Under no circumstances must you enter or leave through the front door at reception unless you are being dropped off late or picked up early from school.

## Kennedy Campus

All students walking to and from Kennedy Campus must enter and leave through the double gates in Coghill Street near the MPB or through the Witt Street gates near the school crossing. All students please use the school crossing in Witt Street when moving between the Wexford and Kennedy campuses.

## Yard Duty Supervision

No bus is provided following Homework Club on Tuesdays. Parents are advised to collect their children from the front office after the student has signed out in the Library.



## Same Day Notification of Unexplained Student Absences

Protecting the safety and wellbeing of children through reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and the school.

Parents and carers have an obligation to notify the school of their child's absence as soon as possible on the day of absence using the school's preferred method, including use of an online IT or app, by telephone or by email.

## New School Attendance Guidelines

All schools must contact parents/carers as soon as practical on the same day of an unexplained student absence.

The same day notification requirement supports the safety and wellbeing of all students. Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and parents/carers need to know if their child is not at school. Prompt communication also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of a child's education.

## Schools and parents working together to support student attendance

Building positive and collaborative relationships through clear communications with parents and carers is critical to the successful implementation of the same day notification requirement.

The responsibility needs to be underpinned by shared understandings and expectations about the procedures for monitoring, recording and follow-up of students attendance.

## What is the school's responsibility?

The school must notify parents and carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained absence.

Sacred Heart College will send an sms to parents/carers by 9.30am each morning.

## Follow-up (where required)

At times the parent/carer may not be able to be reached because the school does not have their correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.). In this instance, the school should attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on the child's file held by the school, where possible, on the same day of the unexplained absence.

## Parent/carer's responsibility

Parents/carers are required to ensure their child attends school every day and have an obligations to contact the school to notify the school of their child's absence.

Parents/carers should inform the school in advance of known upcoming absences, or on the day of absence as soon as practicable. In addition, in order to implement this requirement, it is essential that parent/carers provide the school with their most up-to-date contact details.
