# Science in the Great Outdoors

This year's Mercy Value, "Care for our common home," is easy to relate to RE, but the same can be said about our Science Curriculum. In the last few weeks, our students have spent some time outdoors studying the importance of our ecosystems.

#### Year 9 Science - Chinaman's Island

The Year 9 Science classes went on an excursion to Chinaman's Island to learn about the interactions between living and non-living things in our local environment. They collected a lot of evidence, including photographs and soil and water samples, to help them explain the importance of the relationships they discovered. Through this unit, we have also discussed the influence natural disasters and human actions have on our natural world with the hopeful intention of creating informed and responsible citizens.









#### **Unit 1 Biology – Winton Wetlands Excursion**

As part of their Unit 1 Biology classes, students visited the Winton Wetlands, near Benalla, to spend time with a senior restorative ecologist and conducted fieldwork in one of the

southern hemisphere's largest ephemeral ecosystems. During the experience, the budding biologists collected field data, using transect lines, quadrat sampling, and evaluated physical and chemical water quality. The purpose of the trip was to learn about the importance of interrelationships in our ecosystem and how species adapt to a changing environment. It is important that the wetlands be restored, and students learned about the projects and techniques ecologists are using to return the wetlands to natural balance after decades of being used as a water storage area, formerly known as Lake Mokoan.







#### **Sacred Heart College Student Pathways**

Over the past few years Sacred Heart College has had great success in partnering with local businesses in providing students with opportunities to attend work placements as part of their VCE / VET / VCAL pathway.

As a result, the College has assisted in facilitating employment opportunities to many of our students as an exit strategy to their formal schooling. This has included full time employment, traineeships and apprenticeships.

Over the past few years many of our students have undertaken a variety of Traineeships, School Based Apprenticeships, TAFE courses or weekly work placements in various industries as part of their schooling.



#### **Year 11 CBD Camp**

We then had the opportunity to tour around the Campus and get a glimpse of how life may look following our time at school in the coming years. For those not interested in attending university, they had the chance to visit one of Melbourne's many large scale construction sites to gain insight into possible career options. That evening, we walked to Crown Metropol and played arcade games, laser tag and ten pin bowling where Mr Byrne came out on top. The next day, we woke up bright and early and had bacon and eggs for breakfast. We walked to Federation Square and met the Great Race staff who let us roam free around the city, completing a number of tasks to earn points in groups of six. The challenges included being proposed to on a tram, eating Tim Tams and Vegemite, doing the Nut Bush at Flinders Street Station and even taking a trip to Chinatown to eat anchovies. Some teams even returned sporting temporary face tattoos after opening the secret challenge in an attempt to come out on top. Teams were left disappointed when "The Barbz" (Liam, Jess, Jess, Joel, Riley and Bella) took home the victory sporting the green and blue great race medals. We went shopping after the 'Great Race", spending up big in the city.
