VCE Business Management Unit 1: In the Classroom

Unit 1 Business Management (Planning a Business) is a very engaging and applicable course of study for students with plenty of opportunity for class discussion of business ideas and current events.

As a class we have been exploring the concept of entrepreneurship and the characteristics of successful entrepreneurs. We have identified and analysed personal and financial motivations for starting a business such as to make a profit and/or fulfil a social need. Students have the opportunity to reflect on their own goals for developing a business idea. We have explored a range of different sources of business opportunity such as fulfilling a gap in the market or technological developments. They have also explored the importance of protecting a business idea through methods such as trademarks, patents, copyright, design rights and domain names.

The importance of goal setting has been explored in depth using the straightforward and recognised methods of developing S.M.A.R.T. goals.

- Specific
- Measurable
- Attainable/Achievable
- Relevant
- Time Bound

Students had the opportunity to develop personal goals, academic goals and work/career/business goals.

This was followed up by learning about the importance of decision making in a business discovering a simple five step decision-making process. They have developed an understanding of market research, the importance of collecting and analysing data on specific markets and also understanding the components of a feasibility study.

Students have also developed an understanding of how important business is to the nation's economic and social wellbeing, exploring the concepts of economic growth, balance of payments and the three basic economic questions (What and how much to produce? How to produce? For whom to produce).

Students have their first School Assessed Coursework (SAC) coming up where they will be required to read a contemporary case study/studies and answer structured questions ranging from lower order questions (such as define, explain, describe) through to higher order questions such as (discuss and evaluate.) They will complete a practice SAC prior to help them understand the requirements of Business Assessment and gain important feedback on areas they need to revise and study prior to the formal assessment.

This course really focuses on developing students' skills in describing and applying business concepts to contemporary examples at the same time really allowing students to share, discuss and create their own potential business ideas. The course content is highly relevant and applicable to their lives.

There are also many studies that show playing chess actually makes you smarter!

#### A girl Called Corpse by Reece Carter 2022



To complete the day, our groups competed in a game of trivia. Following a close affair between two of the groups, Mr Skehan's team came out on top, much to his excitement.

After a reflection, we opened the affirmations that everyone had to write to each other which brought a positive vibe to the room and made everyone laugh. 


