We look forward to seeing what more they can do this semester.

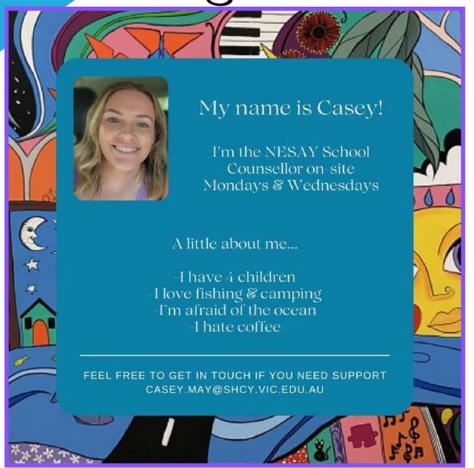
